The J. Clinton Hawkins and Lamplighter Awards are given annually to Y volunteers whose service has been exemplary and sustained over the years. The Dick Stoll Award recognizes a YMCA employee who has furthered the spirit of philanthropy in the YMCA.

2014 J. Clinton Hawkins Award (St. Louis Association)

Presented to: Phil Roush

Roush has served in various leadership roles for the Kirkwood-Webster Family YMCA for more than 30 years. He has been a member of the branch's board of directors since 1988, and served as the branch representative to the Metropolitan Board of Directors. He is also active with the Y's International Program, acting as the International Committee Chairman, hosting visitors and traveling abroad with other Y leaders.

2014 Lamplighter Award Winner (SW Illinois Association)

William Gavin has been involved with the YMCA of Southwest Illinois since 1988, and has been an officer of the Board of Directors since 1995. He has always taken an active role in helping raise funds for the Annual Campaign and was instrumental in starting a new scholarship that honors outstanding youth in the Southwest Illinois region who, in addition to being academically accomplished, are also active in their local YMCA.

Thomas Hartmann has been involved with the Y for more than three decades. Cesar Silva joined the YMCA of Greater St. Louis in 2002, and is now vice president of operations for the Association's western district. Under his leadership, branches have experienced significant growth in volunteerism, membership and donations. In fact, over the past three years, the branches in Silva's district have increased their fundraising dollars for the Strong Community Campaign, United Way and golf events by 26 percent.
