PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



DIABETES PREVENTION INITIATIVE

In collaboration with the Y's Community Health Team, student leaders have explored local clinics, partnered with local community gardens and public health initiatives to address food insecurity in North St. Louis and the Metro East.



AMERICA READS

Student leaders support youth academic success through community partnerships. This year, leaders collaborated with Turn the Page STL to pilot a phonics-based tutoring program. Highlights: 142 youth tutored at STL Public Libraries and Schools.



SCIENCE OLYMPIAD

A national STEM competition program for youth hosted by student leaders for the first time in person at WashU. Highlights: 250 middle school students served in the fall, 550 high school students served in the spring. Student leaders will continue to launch new teams and expand access.



SAFE TRICK OR TREAT

In collaboration with more than 20 other student-led organizations, student leaders welcomed more than 300 community members to a a safe trick or treating expeirence for families while building community among students on campus.



EINSTEIN EXPLORERS

A student-led STEAM program brought to children in hospitals and after-school programs. This year, their reach expanded to St. Louis and Ritenour Public Schools.
